


CHILD ADVOCACY CENTER (CAC)


The Child Advocacy Center provides a child-focused environment to gently support child victims of sexual and physical abuse and their non-offending family members. The Center encourages a coordinated response to the investigation, prosecution and treatment of child abuse.

MEASURABLE OUTCOMES

The Outcome Measurement System (OMS) helps CACs evaluate their programs in order to increase the quality of services provided to children and families and to improve the collaborative efforts of the multidisciplinary team (MDT) members. OMS allows Children's Advocacy Centers to report on two measurable outcomes:

- 1. The CAC facilitates healing for the child and the caregivers. Recent Results: 99% of caregivers believed that their children felt safe at the center.
- 2. The MDT approach results in more collaborative and efficient case investigations.

Results: 95% all members of the MDT, as defined by the needs of specific cases, are actively involved.

DARKNESS

This 2-hour video-based presentation can be given to any community group but is particularly fitting for individuals who work directly with children. It is a nationally distributed, evidence-based program that aims to educate adults to be responsible for preventing, recognizing, and reacting to child abuse.

COURT APPOINTED SPECIAL ADVOCATE (CASA)


The CASA Program, which stands for Court Appointed Special Advocate, recruits, screens, trains and supervises volunteers to advocate for abused and neglected children involved in the court system to help secure a permanent, safe home. CASA volunteers are appointed by a judge to work first, last and always in the best interest of the child at the heart of a case.

253 children had a CASA volunteer in 125 cases



CHILD GENDER 48% 52%


CHILD ETHNICITY HISPANIC/




CHILD AGE



CASA VOLUNTEER ETHNICITY




CASA VOLUNTEER AGE

MEASURING OUR IMPACT: Evidence-Based Outcomes

CASA of Weld County participates in Colorado CASA and its statewide Outcomes Project. This project focuses on measuring outcomes to answer the question "How are CASA volunteers changing the odds for children?" Colorado CASA's response to this issue is to provide outcomes where meaningful change is measurable, sustainable, linked to the program's efforts and there is accountability for results.




